How to Communicate Respectfully and Inclusively

1. Put the person at the center:

- When possible, ask individuals how they prefer to be identified;
- Try to place the term "person" before specifying characteristics (the migrant person, the deaf person).

2. Express yourself in a welcoming and non-hostile manner

commit to avoiding prescriptive phrases (it is mandatory, the candidate must...) when they are not necessary

3. Challenge stereotypes and prejudices

increase your awareness of this and, whenever possible, involve marginalized groups in the design/revision of content.

4. For Gender-Sensitive Language:

- always avoid the generic masculine;
- use feminine forms for terms related to roles and positions when they are held by a woman;
- reflect on the use of schwa (ə) and other symbols, being mindful of accessibility and readability issues..

5. To talk about disability

always put the person at the center and use the most appropriate terms for the different types of disabilities.

6. When Italian is not the first language

always focus on clarity and simplicity in the texts for the people you are addressing.

7. Make the language accessible

pay attention to font choices and text structure. Create clear content using common words and simple syntax.

8. Pay attention to the choice of images

ensure that images are equally representative, avoiding stereotypical symbolic associations. Avoid conveying hierarchical relationships of inferiority.

9. Exercise the ability to make language inclusive and accessible

on the texts you read daily and those you write.

10. Encourage those around you to use inclusive and accessible language

by sharing the good practices you encounter.
